The attendees of our Lenten Bible study gathered for one last evening with the Reverend Doctor Ted Lutz, as he completed not just a study over one Lenten season, but a five year study venture into the sayings of Jesus, as found in the Synoptic Gospels of the Bible. While the study of what Jesus really said was an area of great interest to him since his time in Theological College, it was not until the last few years that he was able to take on a project of this magnitude, resulting in the publication of his book, which can be borrowed through the church library.

A Message from the Chair of Council

Dear Christ First Friends,

Spring is always a time at Christ First to reflect upon our programs of the past year, and to look forward to what is in store for our Council, our committees and our life and work together as a congregation. As I look back on my term as Council Chair, I recall that it began with a sense of cautious optimism just a few months after having left the worst days of the Covid pandemic. Our doors had newly reopened to the congregation and community, while the digital ministry presence established during the pandemic was beginning to flourish. Our new Lead Minister had been settled in for a full year, inspiring us spiritually and asking us the challenging questions. There was a collective sense of energy and purpose around moving forward in the 'new normal'. And yes – we have started to do that!

In the coming days, you will receive the Annual Report which will be presented for approval at the June 9 Semi-annual Congregational Meeting. In it you will be able to read updates from all the areas of life and work of Christ First. Amid all of the ongoing activity of our staff and volunteers, there have been some defining moments for Christ First that speak to moving forward with intention based on our growing understanding of who we see ourselves to be as a community of faith.

- Last June, the Affirming Church study group was established by our Council, to lead our congregational work in deciding whether Christ First should become an Affirming congregation. The undertaking of this journey as a faith and social justice issue speaks directly to our Three Pillars: Spiritually Engaged, Caring & Connected, and Community Focused.
- In November, Council voted 'yes' to a UCC remit to allow the development of a new, autonomous national Indigenous organization within the United Church of Canada, thereby acknowledging Indigenous people's rights to their own spiritual identities and to self-determination. In early April, we learned that our support for this remit was part of a resounding 'yes' from pastoral charges and regional councils across Canada. continued...

 In October, Christ First revisited and refreshed its visioning process begun in November 2019, by engaging the congregation in conversations about who we now want to be to those in our congregation and in our community. This was followed by a series of strategic planning workshops by Council, and the work continues as the newly established Strategic Planning Steering Committee oversees next steps in refining strategies that will support us in achieving our goals over the next few years in a sustainable way. A strategic planning update will be provided at our upcoming congregational meeting.

It has been my privilege to lead the work of Council during a busy and, at times, challenging year. Christ First is fortunate to have such a strong team of dedicated and talented leaders and volunteers, and I want to express my gratitude and blessings for all the work that will continue into the coming year.

The group generally meets every 3-6 weeks, and has been following the steps laid out by Affirm United, beginning with examining our current church policies through the lens of an congregation. inclusive Significant achievements to date include the revision of our wedding, funeral, and baptism policies, influencing work on a new church Call and Vision Statement, creating bulletin board in the office hallway to provide current Affirming information, and providing "Did you know?" facts in our weekly eblast from the church office.

What is the Affirming Ministry Program?

The Affirming Ministries Program is a network of United Church of Canada ministries of all kinds that strive be fully inclusive of people of all sexual orientations and gender identities. And it asks each ministry to take action. The program was launched in 1992, and The United Church officially endorsed the program in 2000 and encouraged its ministries to participate. The program encourages all United Church bodies, and other Christian traditions, to study and discern what it means to be publicly welcoming and inclusive in their context. Currently, there are over 200 Affirming ministries and ministries in the process across Canada.



We are already welcoming - why do we need to be "Affirming"?

Some ministries already have many signs of inclusion. They may feel they include everyone and wonder why they would need to specifically mention sexual orientation or gender identity. Being an Affirming Ministry is not merely about welcoming people of all sexual orientations and gender identities. Words like "welcoming" or "inclusion" suggest those on the inside have the power to choose to accept those on the outside. This makes it sound like an act of charity to welcome those who are marginalized. However, it is not our place to welcome anyone, because church is not a private club and we are not the gatekeepers. The LGBTQ+ community faces specific and deliberate rejection and shaming in the community, and particularly in religious places of worship — The United Church of Canada included. Jesus' ministry included all, especially those who were excluded for any reason. The Gospel calls us to do the same!





"Becoming an affirming church is important to me because I want to show that we genuinely welcome and support LGBTQ+ people. It's about creating a safe and loving community, where everyone, including my friends and family, can feel they belong. This work is crucial because it helps break down barriers and promotes understanding and acceptance. " -Duncan Wheeler, Affirming Study Group

Renewed Policies for Christ First

Some time ago I was asked, as Chair of Worship, to lead the work of revisiting the policies covering weddings, funerals, and baptisms at Christ First. It is not unusual for a newly-amalgamated church to reconsider policies to make sure they reflect the vision of the new church going forward. This process of revision was delayed by COVID, and by the wait for a newly-called minister, to be part of this policy process. Drawing together the various editions and formats of existing policies was also a time-consuming task.

From the beginning, the intent was to create policies which would be equitable to all, fiscally responsible and compliant with the rules set out by The United Church of Canada and the Canada Revenue Agency. Initial discussion took place with those dealing most closely with funerals and weddings in our church. This included the office staff, our ministerial staff, and me as Chair of Worship, on behalf of the Committee. Later discussions included representation from Welcoming & Fellowship, the Funeral Reception Committee, Property, and Finance. Final approvals for all three policies were passed by our Council, on the recommendation of the Worship Committee.

With our goal to be fully equitable, language needed to be updated to make the policies as inclusive as possible. In consultation with the Affirming Study Group, they all now name consistently that: "Our congregation is an inclusive faith community, and welcomes families and individuals of all gender expressions, identities, and sexual orientations. Christ First strives to ensure that all are treated equitably". We also updated language on sacramental practices, pertaining to baptism and replaced references to specific rooms with more general terms that would apply to either of our current locations.

An equitable policy also needed to reconsider the existing fee structure. Bringing together the previous congregational practices and expectations, from our time as Christ Church and First United, was not an easy task. Those working through the revisions were very mindful of traditions <u>continued...</u>

and did not want to upset any of our church community. All levels of past and present contribution and support are appreciated deeply. Taking precedence, however, is clear policy from both The United Church of Canada and Canada Revenue Agency that does not allow a "member price" for any Non-Profit or Charitable organization. Charging non-members for a reception and offering a similar event to members without charge put the church in a dangerous position when it came to our status as a charitable organization. Additionally, the practice of receiving a tax receipt for a donation to offset the cost of a reception is not aligned with CRA or UCC financial guidelines. Careful thought and consideration were given to this complicated balance, where we want to honour and care with sensitivity, while also not jeopardizing the charitable status that supports our ministry for the sake of the whole community.

As the updated fee structure now shows, funeral charges are now applicable to anyone regardless of congregational membership. They relate only to staff resources, and for a reception if requested. Should the reception be provided by congregation volunteers, this charge would be aimed at recovering the cost of the refreshments. Should the reception be catered privately, this cost would be assessed and collected separately by the caterer.

The fees for weddings remain the same as before and include charges for room rentals, staff time, and reception as necessary. They, too, are applicable to anyone regardless of congregational membership.

There are no fees associated with baptisms.

Remembering that these policies relate to pivotal moments in a family's journey, we trust the revised structures will strengthen our call as a congregation, as we seek to support all God's people, 'in life, in death, in life beyond death'.

Update from the United Church of Canada: Passage of Remit 1

Remit 1: Establishing an Autonomous National Indigenous Organization has passed with 1,482 pastoral charges voting in favour and 93 pastoral charges voting either "no" or not voting. Remit 1 was a Category 3 remit, meaning that any pastoral charge not voting was counted as a "No" vote, underscoring the importance that each community across the country cast a vote. The Christ First Council voted unanimously to record a vote of "Yes" and Christ First's vote was submitted well ahead of the March 31, 2024 deadline.

With the passing of Remit 1, the United Church of Canada (UCC) formally enshrined has the independent nature the of Indigenous Council (of the United Church), allowing the National Indigenous Council (NIC) to itself constitute in whatever manner its members decide. In their response to the passage of Remit 1, the NIC notes that the work of Right Relations continues in a positive direction. Please find the official response of the NIC at link or QR Code to the right.

Remit 1 was a cornerstone of the UCC's Right Relationship with Indigenous peoples. The support of United Church communities for its passage allows the UCC's actions to match its nation-wide advocacy on this issue.





We Are Called to Share

As the Horseshoe Falls Region assists more churches with managing their declining communities, the Region would like communities to know that many of their best options lie in collaboration. Across the Region and across the country, communities are partnering in activities. From worship, to community building, to space-sharing, and outreach – the types of activities in which communities are partnering is not limited.

At the Vulnerable Congregational Discussion on March 5, the Region heard from members in dozens of congregations about their vulnerabilities. There are common signs in each vulnerable congregation (i.e., declining revenues, declining membership). The takeaways here are the same: keep doing what you do well and is within your capacity to do. Share what you do well and others can contribute to it, and you could receive what they do well in return.

Any student of Adam Smith, the famous Scottish philosopher and economist, will recognize the value in this principal. Communities who partner on events, initiatives, or in regular worship can focus more people on supporting those particular activities. More fundraising can be focused on activities that give higher value. Stronger bases are available from which to apply for external funding.

As Vicky Nelson wrote in a blog posted on the United Church of Canada's website "aside from statements of faith, what keeps our denomination whole is that in The United Church of Canada, no one owns anything and yet we all own everything on behalf of each other, the wider church. We are all called to care for this shared abundance together and to commit our own resources of time and money to the vision of an unfolding and flourishing church. When each community of faith is left to sort out its own household, without a critical eye, we are losing a golden opportunity to consider how United Churches could do more ministry and meaning-making with collaboration instead of competition." ¹

What is meaningful is what we do together. What we do together is more than what we can do apart.
