

In 2022, Christ First was awarded the Embracing the Spirit grant from EDGE: A Network for Ministry Development. This was a three-year financial grant, conditional on the yearly success of our Community Network Ministry initiatives. In the fall of 2023, we submitted a report on the success and development of our first year of work on our South Mississauga Nonprofit Networking program, and I am happy to say that our report was well received, and we have been awarded our second year of funding!

This initiative continues to grow, having now hosted nine breakfast events, which have been attended by over 30 different organizations who have ties to non-profit work done here in South Mississauga. This January, we were joined by David Onuoha, a local Registered Psychotherapist, who shared a workshop with us on "Relational Wellness for

the Overworked Professional." He discussed how those who work and volunteer in community service often find themselves giving more and more of their time, and how this can affect their home lives and professional relationships. This workshop was incredibly well received, and was a good reminder for all those who attended to take time to slow down and give care to our loved ones and our relationships.

We are looking forward to our next Nonprofit Networking Breakfast in February, where we will welcome Epilepsy South Central Ontario for a presentation leading up to

Epilepsy Awareness Month in March, and another event in April where the Writers Collective of Canada will be doing a writing workshop with the group. Thank you to all the volunteers who help make these events so special and successful! Here's to a great second year!








The History of Sip and Serve

In 1997, the then Chair of Property at Christ Church saw the need for a work crew of volunteers who would be the implementers of jobs coming out of the Property Committee. He also hoped that they would do the many small jobs



around the church that fell outside of the job descriptions of our then resident caretakers. Without too much thought, he decided that Saturday morning would be a good time to do tasks and drew up a request for volunteers to be read from the pulpit. At the scheduled time, on the first appointed Saturday, he stood ready with a job list he had drawn up and waited. Only one volunteer showed up: an elderly gentleman with no toolbox. Together they knocked off some of the easier tasks on the job list. Mr. Bolton, the property Chairman, an eternal optimist, wrote off the poor turnout to the fact that the request had not had time to sink in and prepared for a second Saturday. The second Saturday was an exact duplicate of the first with the same single volunteer.

Unbeknownst to Mr. Bolton, another group headed by Nora and Bill Hatton had also seen the need for a work crew. Their approach turned out to be much more appealing and the midweek morning time more suitable for retirees who were their target for volunteers. Their first meeting featured tea and coffee, a time to converse and socialize, and a joke or humorous story to set a pleasant tone. They also came up with a name for their group "Sip and Serve" which was both catchy and informative. The group was an immediate success and attendance soared. Mr. Bolton was thrilled to see the success. He immediately ceased his Saturday project and became a worker in "Sip and Serve". His Property connection helped with the job list necessary to keep volunteers gainfully employed.

A few years later, disaster struck. Bill Hatton died suddenly with no forewarning. Bill had been the MC since inception and had a great collection of humorous stories. Mr. Bolton took over and tried to maintain the successful reputation that S&S continued...

had achieved in its early years. A number of years later, the Chancel Guild blended its activities with S&S. The work of the guild is very sporadic. Their workload is concentrated around the key festive occasions on the Church calendar. This fits well with providing a list of meaningful undertakings for our volunteers. For some time S&S monitored furnace filters and had a list of motors requiring periodic lubrication.

Over the years at least two "graduates" who had moved to homes remote from Clarkson saw fit to tell us that they had helped establish service groups in their new churches modelled after Sip and Serve. There have been several attempts to put a dollar value on the value of S&S services, Despite the difficulty in separating socializing time from work periods, they have invariably come up with a number in the thousands in annual savings over what it would have cost the church had tasks been done by commercial services.

The COVID Pandemic set the organization back on its heels and eventually it ceased to function. In 2022, Elisabeth Evans and John Hammill resurrected the organization and under their guidance it has been in a recovery state ever since. It meets Wednesday mornings at 9:30 in the Merigold Room and is always in need of more volunteers. Should any of the readers of this write-up decide to give it a try, they would be most welcome.




2024 Lenten Bible Study Seminar

Easter arrives early this year, which means so does Ash Wednesday with its concomitant first Monday in Lent. Christ Church (now Christ First) has been pursuing Bible studies via a Lenten series for over half a century.

We have been examining in detail the Sayings of Jesus as we find them recorded in the first three books of the New Testament, the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. It has taken five years to test each Saying against a set of criteria that might provide some assurance that what we read comes from Jesus, not from the writer, or some earlier source, of the Gospel. The study has resulted in a book, which I anticipate will be printed by Easter this spring.



Consequently, five sessions ought to be sufficient to finish covering the last of the Sayings. If not, so few will be left by March 25 that they can be looked at 'in the book.' Books may be obtained from the church office after Easter. Also, because the results of this study will be available in another form, sessions will not be offered online. Registration will be available online or by calling the office.

In fifty years, we have covered all the biblical material that interests most Christians, so 2024 ends a tradition that began in 1975. There are former Christ

Church members who have attended every session. I would like to end by thanking them, and everyone else who over the years has attended any series, for their interest and support. I have benefited immensely, intellectually and spiritually, in your company. \uparrow

These donations have been distributed to various local schools. We also continue our shawl-knitting ministry. Prayer Shawls are kept in the cupboard in the Merigold Room, where you can find shawls of various sizes. Shawls can be taken at any time to be passed along people in need of support or a warm hug (receivers may be members of the church or also friends and neighbours.) When our friends wear these shawls, they may be reminded that they are connected with many people throughout our faith community. The gift of a shawl is a reminder that you are not alone. Update on The Compass for 2023

2023 was an extremely challenging year for many. News headlines were filled with reports of how many families and individuals were suffering from economic hardship, food insecurity and homelessness.

Not surprisingly, many in our own community were directly impacted by what was going on all around us. As a result, during the year 2023 The Compass served significantly more people than ever in the history of our operations. Month after month the numbers kept going up:

- 6,567 individuals received food, an increase of 63% over 2022. This was more than a 300% increase from the number of individuals helped in 2019.
- We gave out over 1 million pounds of food, an increase of 45% from 2022.
- 1,883 new "households" in our community had to come in for help, an increase of 87% from 2022.
- It cost almost \$1 million in 2023 to purchase food and stock our shelves, a 61% increase over 2022. And this was despite the fact we received over 200,000 lbs. of donated food from the community and 500,000 lbs. from Food Banks Mississauga.

We are so very pleased to be able to report that due to the wonderful hardworking and dedicated Compass staff and the amazingly reliable team of almost 400 volunteers, we were able to service each and every client who came through our doors in 2023. And the best news is, because of the incredible inflow of monies from our financial supporters and donors throughout the year, we ended our fiscal financial year 2023 with a much smaller deficit than we had expected.

On behalf of The Compass Board, I would like to extend my sincere thank you to Christ First congregants. The steady inflow of funds from our committed and caring church members via PAR and other means, was so very much appreciated. The combined donations received in 2023 from all our various member churches was just under \$100,000 (7% of total donations received) and I am proud to say that the amount donated from Christ First ranked at the top.

Thank you, once again, for your generosity in 2023. Helping Children In Haiti



For over 50 years, Barb Lewis has been providing clean and waterproof sleeping mats to mothers and children in Haiti. The mats are made out of cheap and simple materials many of us would simply toss away – milk bags.

Barb first got the idea from observing kindergarten children in Ottawa making the mats. She thought it was a wonderful idea and decided to try her hand at it. Her husband Claude designed a special weaving frame that is portable so Barb can do her weaving while watching TV. Barb cuts the milk bags into strips which she rolls into balls ready for weaving. It takes her a month to make one sleeping mat.

The end result is an attractive, colourful mat that can withstand the challenges of life in Haiti. It is waterproof, washable and won't rot in the hot sun. It is also resistant to mice and rodents. It is large enough to sleep a mother and child together.

Barb sends 12 to 15 sleeping mats to Haiti each year through the Children Canadian Food for organization. She is always looking for more milk bags. If you have extra milk bags, please drop them off in the stairwell near the Office on top of the Compass donation box. Barb asks that you please cut open the bags, flatten them and them in quarters before passing them on to her. 🕆

Christ First is in the midst of imagining its future. The process started pre-pandemic, with the November 2019 Visioning session. Another Visioning session was held last October. Council is working hard to develop a cogent set of strategies to pull us in the directions indicated from our October 2023 session. This will take wisdom and imagination.

Our plans must consider the overall context of our operating reality. We are in a post organized religion era. We see churches in our area consolidating. We see attendance dwindling. There are reasons why organizations such as the United Church of Canada and Indwell have launched separate property development firms. There is much worship space property coming on the market. We may be seduced by occasional upticks in membership, but we cannot buck the tide.

We can have it all. We can create an enduring legacy in our community, burnishing our brand as true Christians. We can have accessibility. We can have diverse worship activities.

We need to be bold and imaginative.

Imagine being the church that spearheaded a drive to create dozens of deeply affordable housing units along with maintaining affordable space for the community services that already use our space. To bolster the imagination here are a few relevant points.

Meadow Green Academy, which co-owns the property they occupy with Clarkson Community Church, is ready and willing to sell their half of the property to Clarkson Community Church. Rough order of magnitude of the funds required is \$6,000,000. Clarkson Community Church is ready to partner with a like-minded organization to buy out the school. continued... 23

The school building existing on the site is suitable for a host of community agencies, such as we provide space for today.

Indwell is interested in a fourth Mississauga location. They are interested in this property. They have engaged Clarkson Community Church in preliminary discussion but will not proceed until Clarkson Community Church partners with some like-minded entity, or otherwise comes up with, \$6,000,000 to buy out the school.

There is real opportunity in the above to create an enduring legacy rooted in the bedrock of Christian values.

As we develop Christ First's strategic plan for the future, let's think how we can create an enduring legacy. Depending on the goals we set for our church, we could look at opportunities such as partnering with Clarkson Community Church and negotiating with Indwell. There will be lots of possibilities for Council and others to explore in planning the way forward.

Jesus himself saw a vision for renewal that no-one else could. Let me leave you with that story in John 2: 19-22;

Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and I will raise it again in three days." They replied, "It has taken forty-six years to build this temple, and you are going to raise it in three days?" But the temple he had spoken of was his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples recalled what he had said. Then they believed the scripture and the words that Jesus had spoken.
