

Christ First is working with In from the Cold, our latest community tenant, to help God's most marginalized individuals in our society. Referred to as "people of no fixed address", from October 24 to March 31, 2024 their place of refuge and sanctuary seven nights a week is the lower level of our church building at the Port Credit campus.

The In from the Cold program is managed by staff and security hired and trained by the Clarkson Community Church congregants, located at 1880 Lakeshore Road West in Clarkson Village. This all is totally funded by the Region of Peel through the Federal Government.

Christ First is supplying the lower-level space with use of the kitchen for hot meals and fridge storage, tables and chairs for consuming meals, a wireless motion camera system for security, and custodial cleaning and supplies for ongoing bathroom continued...

necessities. Partitions are provided to allow privacy where women sleep on the upper stage area, while the men sleep on the auditorium level.

The occupants are allowed access to the lower level through the rear fire entrance stairwell in the alleyway between the Clark Hall and the West Edge Church (previously the Chapel of Christ First and attached to the main sanctuary). They are allowed access starting at 9:30 p.m. and leave at 7:30 a.m. daily, having spent the night in a warm environment with bathroom facilities and a hot meal for nourishment. This access is necessary so as not to interrupt the programs of our existing Community Tenants using the Peter Street entrance and main entrance of the sanctuary. It is on a "first come, first served" basis and some individuals may be turned away depending on staff's ability to handle and feed the numbers.

The first night, on October 24, we accommodated 13 individuals. By Saturday, October 28, we were housing 35 people. What will happen when the weather really gets cold in the months of January and February? In our communications with members of the Clarkson Community Church, the statistics for shelters in the Region of Peel are at 250 % capacity. If we are only funded for 30 individuals per night by the Government, how do we accept more of God's marginalized people into our sanctuary?

This will be an ongoing problem for everyone this winter. We will keep you informed but it may mean some extra funding from all local churches to supplement the shortfall from Federal Government funding.

Council Says Yes to the Remit

A recent letter from Council informed all Christ First members that Council had voted in favour of a remit that will allow the development of a new, autonomous National Indigenous Organization (NIO) within the United Church. Governing bodies, and not congregations, are required to vote on the remit.

Approval of the remit acknowledges Indigenous peoples' rights to their own spiritual identities and to self-determination. This has the potential to create a new kind of relationship between the Indigenous peoples and the United Church: in the words of the National Indigenous Council, moving "from 'missions to Indians' ... towards being 'partners in God's call to all the earth."

Council supports the position that this remit is the logical and necessary next step for the United Church to move away from being a colonial church and toward being an actively anti-racist and inclusive church. This is consistent with Christ First's exploration of becoming an Affirming Church.

Update from Horseshoe Falls Region and the United Church of Canada

A large focus of the activity in the Region and of the United Church this fall has been on activities related to Truth and Reconciliation. This may not be surprising, given that the United Church of Canada now has the first Indigenous national church leader of any faith in Canada, the Right Rev. Dr. Carmen Landsdowne.

Truth and Reconciliation is a process, not an event. It is intended to heal the wounds of the past and put all of us collectively in a better relationship with Indigenous communities.

Did you know that there are dozens of Indigenous communities which have United Churches within their communities? Did you know that some of these communities have Indigenous United Church ministers? These are scattered across the country, with a good number of them located in Ontario. The National Indigenous Council has existed for decades and Indigenous churches have existed for more than a century. As we know, their experience has been much different from most of our church experiences – yet they consider themselves a part of our same faith. For an excerpt of their historical perspective, here are some recent words of the National Indigenous (United) Church leaders:

"Methodist and Presbyterian missionaries came among us in the nineteenth century. Many of these missionaries were Indigenous. Our oldest congregation, the Grand River Methodist Mission, has been serving the people since 1825. In 1925, the United Church was born through the act of union. The Indigenous churches of the Methodist and Presbyterian churches were not consulted about union, they were simply moved between institutions and became United Church "missions." The first act of the United Church treated us "like children" unable to make our own decisions, and defending our rights as autonomous Nations has been a struggle ever since.

Indigenous people have met regularly over many decades and held deep and ongoing conversations about matters relating to our Indigenous Ministries and continued...

our relationship with the United Church. We have been evolving, struggling, adapting, and growing since church union. Unwittingly, the church restructuring of 2018, caused crisis in the National Indigenous Circle by destabilizing our ways of working together. our relationship with the United Church. It is time for us to move towards a different relationship. It is time to set aside the notion of "missions to the Indians" and truly move towards being "partners in God's call to all the earth."

All left the Christ First concert having enjoyed a wonderful event!



Compass Governance Update

The Compass must be compliant with the new Ontario Not for Profit Corporations Act (ONCA) by October 2024. We intend to have our new by-laws presented at the next AGM in early 2024.



As ONCA is triggering a major review of our by-laws, we are using the opportunity to revisit our governance structure. For most of our 20 plus years of operation years, we remained a small organization, operated and funded largely by local churches. Growth in the last few years has been exponential. We are now a large, high-profile organization with most of the volunteer support and funding being derived from the broader secular community. Our current governance model requires that a member is a church and that the church is to nominate a director to sit on the board of the Compass. This approach provides a structured way to ensure all member churches remain engaged. Conversely, this limits The Compass's ability to proactively recruit governance talent. The existing model also ties board participation directly to the number of congregations operating in the area which is presumed to be unstable as the future unfolds.

The most significant change we are planning is to no longer compel a "member" church to provide a director. We hope that all existing member churches remain members and intend to open membership to other, smaller churches, and perhaps to individuals who profess their Christian faith. A set number of directors will then be elected to the Board by the members. We also intend to require members to be

actively engaged in the work of The Compass. This is the manner we believe will ensure a church remains engaged. It also fits with James 2: 14-17 where we are reminded that faith without action is dead.

Our new model will allow us to open membership to a wider faith circle, enhancing our ecumenical profile, while enabling a full and open director recruitment process.

We strive always for best practices throughout The Compass operation and maintain our top ranking by charity evaluating organizations. Operational excellence is motivated by inspired leadership. †

During this same time last year, they were serving only approximately 1,200 people each week. Options is a social enterprise in Port Credit that, among many things, provides job training and opportunities for adults with intellectual disabilities. Chef James and his team prepared the soup for us for this special event, and they are regular providers to the In From The Cold program now as well. Twice a week, Chef James and his team at Options prepare dinner for the folks staying at In From The Cold – a real example of the ripple effect of paying it forward.

Affirming Study Group

Earlier this year, our Church Council approved the formation of an Affirming Study Group, and this past September, this group began their work. They have been tasked with the important work of guiding our church through the education and discernment process, to eventually advise the wider congregation on their suggestion of whether Christ First should become an Affirming Church. To be Affirming means that you strive for full participation and justice for people of all sexual orientations and gender identities in the church and in society. The group has already met several times, and has tackled topics such as creating an inclusive Marriage Policy and church Vision Statement.

Some ministries already have many signs of inclusion. They may feel they include everyone and wonder why they would need to specifically mention sexual orientation or gender identity. But words like welcoming or inclusion suggest those on the inside have the power to choose to accept those on the outside. Grounded in the radical hospitality of Jesus, expressing God's love for all created beings, Affirming congregations seek to be public, intentional, and explicit in every aspect of their life and work together, actively upholding justice for all people, including those of all sexual orientations

and gender identities.
